What started as a simple training for Colorado districts to make their websites accessible for users with disabilities turned into a sold out event at the History Colorado Center. And wow, it was pretty incredible.

Streamline and SDA Colorado hosted the event right as the state becomes only the second in the US to ensure equal digital access for users with disabilities via House Bill 21-1110.

We welcomed the bill's author, who experienced his own life changing injury while serving his country in Afghanistan. Rep. David Ortiz was overwhelmed with gratitude to see 150 district leaders gathered working hard to implement his bill. Rep. Ortiz and Ann Terry of the Special Districts Association recognized each of them for their hard work.

We also welcomed Javier Kussrow who starred in this year's Super Bowl ad on accessible tech, and Shawn Jordison, a leading authority on creating accessible documents to train and inspire everyone.

I feel honored and humbled to have spent time with a group of public servants so dedicated to accessibility that they would take a full day to tackle the issue hands-on. These district leaders are the unsung heroes in our community, making sure that everyone can be served. They are a true inspiration! I hope to see others follow Colorado's lead to create a more accessible future.

What are all these Colorado laws and rules?



HB 24-1454 Key Takeaways

- ✓ In partnership with Colorado Municipal League and Colorado Counties, Inc., SDA is supporting a bill introduced on Apr 15 that would provide a one-year grace period for the \$3,500 penalties pursuant to HB21-1110 which takes effect July 1, 2024.
- ✓ This would apply to some ADA issues detected on special district websites, so long as good faith progress is being demonstrated. Good faith progress is defined as
 - (1) a progress-to-date report that demonstrates concrete and specific efforts toward compliance,
 - (2) updating the report on a quarterly basis ,
 - (3) creating a clear, easy-to-find process for requesting redress for inaccessible digital products, including contact options that are not dependent on web access or digital accessibility and are prominently displayed on all front-facing web pages.
- ✓ Although this bill would provide a buffer for pain points like historical PDF files and digital signage, districts still need to be compliant by July 1 per federal law. See the SDA and <u>Streamline ADA compliance checklist</u> to make sure you're ready.

On March 8, 2024, the U.S. Department of Education (the Department), Office for Civil Rights (OCR), received a complaint filed against the Antioch Public Library District (the Library) alleging discrimination based on disability. Specifically, the Complainant alleges that the Library is failing to afford persons with disabilities an opportunity to participate in and benefit from the services, programs, and activities communicated through the Library's websites and third-party websites that is equal to opportunities afforded to others.

OCR enforces Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, 42 U.S.C. §§ 12131 et seq., and its implementing regulation, 28 C.F.R. Part 35, which prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability by public entities. As a public entity, the Library is subject to Title II.

Because OCR has determined that it has jurisdiction and that the complaint was filed timely, it is opening this disability discrimination allegation for investigation. Specifically, we will investigate the following issues:

- Whether the Library, on the basis of disability, excluded qualified persons with disabilities from participation in, denied them the benefits of, or otherwise subjected them to discrimination in its programs, activities, aids, benefits, or services in violation of the regulation implementing Title II at 28 C.F.R. § 35.130.
- Whether the Library failed to take appropriate steps to ensure that its communications
 with applicants, participants, members of the public, and companions with disabilities are
 as effective as its communications with others, in violation of the regulation
 implementing Title II at 28 C.F.R. § 35.160(a).

Please note that opening an allegation for investigation in no way implies that OCR has made a determination with regard to its merits. During the investigation, OCR is a neutral fact-finder,

Colorado 2024 Web Accessibility Checklist [download latest]

Congratulations on your commitment to ensuring that your district's website is accessible to your entire community, including those with disabilities. This checklist will help you ensure compliance with HB21-1110 and 8 CCR 1501-11 by the July 1, 2024 deadline.

Before you begin

- ☐ Review the latest <u>Technology Accessibility Rules</u> from Colorado's Office of Information Technology (OIT)
- Perform an initial scan to check for known issues using checkmydistrict.org or another tool
- ☐ Have your website provider's contact information to report any issues

One-time actions - examples available at https://getstreamline.com/accessibility-policy

- Designate an accessibility officer We have designated one staff member to be the accessibility officer who will be the go-to contact for accessibility issues.
- Approve an accessibility policy/transition plan¹ Our board has approved an accessibility policy that
 includes the level of accessibility you are adhering to (WCAG 2.1 AA)
- Create and post an accessibility page We have created a dedicated accessibility website page to house all accessibility-related content.
- Create a process for community concerns We have a process in place where a community member can submit a concern via form, phone number, and/or email address
- Enable closed captions on your videos Our videos all have closed captions, and we have a process for including closed captions in future videos. YouTube includes this for free, when enabled. Learn how.

Ongoing actions - recommended once per month

- Scan your website pages each month We have scanned every page of our website, every page has a
 score and list of issues to remediate. Free tools include <u>checkmydistrict.org</u>, Google Chrome Lighthouse
 (F12 will activate), and achecker.com. Demand your web developer to address any issues that arise.
- Check your attachments We have checked all of our attachments and written a disclaimer for any
 third-party attachments that we do not have the ability to remediate. Note: 8 CCR 1501-11 provides an
 "undue burden" clause that could apply for archived PDFs, although we recommend fixing popular PDFs
- 3. Perform remediations if issues are detected by a scan or reported by your community, take action to fix

Other actions to consider

- Third-party ADA audit larger districts should consider hiring an outside firm to conduct an audit. Manual
 testing by users with disabilities is the gold standard to ensure access.
- · Choosing a platform or insurance that indemnifies or insures you against the risk of fines


Fixing Alt Text on Wordpress


Using Acrobat Pro

- Open the PDF you exported from Word
- Right sidebar, under Tools, choose More Tools
 Accessibility
- Choose Full check
- Right mouse click on anything on the left that shows as failed, and "fix"
- Save PDF






Archived Content as Defined by DOJ



Pressed for time? Consider a service

- ✓ CommonLook, <u>TheAccessibilityGuy.com</u>, etc. (\$7/page)
- ✓ New technologies (e.g. DocAccess <\$0.06/page/mo)</p>
- ✓ Providers through SIPA
- Don't boil the ocean, make a plan and work your way through your documents
 - ✓ May not be possible to fix all documents, so label archived ones
 - that are infrequently accessed



Perform Remediations

- ✓ Insist your vendors do the web remediations
 - contact us for language if you get pushback
 - Add to all RFP language to comply with WCAG 2.1 AA standards (<u>CO vendor letter</u> <u>template</u>)
- .√. Establish a process

Perform Remediations

- ✓ Keep an eye out for nonstandard content
- ✓ if you're embedding a map, adding an infographic, linking to a third-party site, etc. try to provide the content in an accessible format, or at least describe the content so people will know what they are missing and how to contact you for more information.

Third-Party ADA Audit

- ✓ If larger district, consider 3rd party test
- ✓ Use software that is audited, ask for copy of last report or VPAT
- ✓ Especially if manual testing was performed, you can include in your plan

Consider Platform/Insurance

- ✓ Ask what assurances/indemnification your platform provides
- ✓ Evaluate insurance options, if needed
 - e.g. Prowriters, AAATraq
 - Most standard insurance won't cover (e.g. EPLI, Statewide pools, Cyber)
 - Streamline has added coverage for districts

Keep an Eye Out

- √ HB25-1152 Holding Contractors Accountable for Accessibility Compliance
 - Closes a gap where vendors could ignore accessibility laws without consequence.
- ✓ HB25-1219 (Metro Districts)
 - Making critical governance information more accessible (informationally, not ADA).
 - Clarifying how districts operate and how residents can engage.




Legal foundations for website accessibility

WCAG 2.1 AA Guidelines

The international web accessibility guidelines that are referenced (directly and indirectly) by both state and federal laws regarding web accessibility.

Section 508

A law referenced by the ADA that more specifically outlines how to meet accessibility standards for electronic content, including websites.



State Laws

Requires that state agencies comply with accessibility guidelines. Examples include HB 21-1110 in Colorado or AB 434 in California.


ADA Compliance

The Americans with Disabilities Act protects the rights of people with disabilities. It's broad reach extends to websites, but doesn't reference web accessibility specifically.





Silver Thread Public Health (STPHD) was notified on 04/08/2025 of a measles exposure at the Wolf Creek Ski area in Mineral County, STPHD is working diligently and urgently with Archuleta County, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE), and Wolf Creek Ski Area to determine close contacts and disease risk.

Measles is a highly contagious and potentially severe acute viral respiratory illness characterized by a fever, cough, and itchy/red/watery eyes followed by a rash that spreads from the head to the body. Measles is one of the most contagious infectious diseases transmitted when an infected person breaths, coughs, or sneezes—remaining in the air for up to 2 hours after the infected person leaves an area. People at the highest risk of complications include infants and children less than five, adults older than 20, pregnant women, and those with weakened immune systems like leukemia or HIV.

People visiting the following locations on the following dates may have been exposed to measles:



Please monitor yourself and your family for any of the symptoms described above and contact your local public health office to arrange testing if you develop any symptoms. Please isolate yourself from others upon symptom development and until it is confirmed that you do not have measles.

Measles can be effectively prevented with the MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) vaccine that is part of regular childhood immunizations. The vaccine is highly effective and provides more than enough protection for most people. If you were vaccinated between 1968 and 1989, you likely received just one dose of the measles vaccine instead of the two doses that are standard today. One dose alone is highly effective, and it provides more than enough protection for most people. Individuals born before 1957 have assumed immunity from childhood illness.

Please contact your primary care provider to determine if an MMR vaccine is indicated for you or your child.
